### **PASTORAL REFLECTIONS**

#### **Trees or Light Poles, Roots or Anchors?**

As I look out my window at The Landings, I see a beautiful field of trees across the



road, mostly pines, which are the home to deer and other wildlife. The other night I counted ten deer in the field! Closer to my window are several large light poles. The light poles and the pine trees are a stark reminder of contrast between nature and human technology. While yes, I value human technology (I cannot live without indoor plumbing, electric lights, and my computer!), I often think we overlook the beauty of nature, a reminder of God's presence in our lives.

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Carolyn Massiah reflecting upon the trees and

poles outside her window writes:

"When I compare and contrast the tree and the pole, I know I would much rather be a tree....light poles are inorganic entities of concrete or metal, created through some form of human intervention. The shape and size in which these poles are created will forever be their shape and size, as inorganic entities will not change during their existence unless there is additional intervention. Trees, on the other hand, are organic. They are living organisms that continually change. They will lose and gain leaves and branches but they will also grow and mature throughout their existence. Continual growth and development is what I want for my own life. This is why I would rather be a tree than a light pole."

In her comparison between light poles and trees, Massiah also states that one of the main reasons she wants to be a tree is because a tree has roots! She writes:

"Because trees are organic living creatures their roots continue to grow and strengthen as the tree grows and matures. When a storm comes, the roots....allow trees to bend but not break in the storm. Poles do not have that same anchor support. That is why we see more poles than trees down after severe hurricanes."

As we look to the New Year, perhaps what we need to develop are roots, not anchors. Often we want to develop anchors and stand straight and stiff, unbending, not budging, like light poles or the ships that have dropped anchor near the quarry at Marblehead. Anchors chain us to the past and keep us from looking to the present and



**2020 PER CAPITA** \$35.70 creating something new. Instead, perhaps we need to think of ourselves as trees with good sturdy roots. Remember, the roots are fixed points that give the trees strength and give them flexibility.

As we face the new year, we need to rejoice that we have or can have strong roots in the Gospel. We sit in the midst of the mystery, awe, and wonder of God! Can we see the promise and hope of the future? (Advent just reminded us of this!) Can we be trees rooted in Christ and embrace the potential of God to do great things? Can we embrace the new things that God is doing among us and in our lives? Can we be flexible enough to not only see what lies behind us but also look forward to what lies ahead? For we are rooted in Christ!



# SUMMARY OF SESSION MEETING

The regular November Stated Session was held in the church library on Wednesday, December 4, 2019. Session members present included: Jody Amor, Linda Hamilton, John Roush, Larry Stout, Bill Taylor, Bob Humberger, and Rev. Dr. Julie Kling, moderator. Don Steen and Nicole Whetstone were excused.

Pastor Kling led a discussion of the 5<sup>th</sup> mark of a vital congregation, Spirit Inspired Worship. She invited the elders to reflect on the fundamental reasons we come to worship. She suggested we gather each week to praise God, to confess, to question, to contemplate the Word, and to lament. Pastor Kling concluded the discussion in prayer.

The clerk reported the following Sunday Worship Attendance in November: 3 - 61, 10 - 35, 17 - 45, 24 - 49.

Pastor Kling gave a verbal report of her activities in November. She did her normal sermon preparation and preaching on Sundays as well as preparation for Thanksgiving, Hanging of the Green, Advent and Christmas worship opportunities. She met with the Maumee Presbytery Leadership team, did some visitation, worked with the Fellowship and Service Leadership Team to provide a meal for Terra Students, met with two other pastors to discuss leading Mathew 25 churches, met with the FPC Foundation Board, and coordinated some bell ringers for the Salvation Army.

The Treasurer's report is summarized as: November income - \$8,802; November expenditures - \$12,942; November net - (\$4,141); Year to date income - \$124,623; and year to date expenditures - \$103,277; and Year to date net - \$21,346.

Administration and Finance – Budget proposals for 2020 are due from all but one Leadership Team; 127 no responses on newsletter survey; team will crosscheck for shut-ins; new property and liability insurance is cheaper. Fellowship and Service - Jan. fellowship luncheon will be hosted by Presbyterian Women; Feb will be a potluck hosted by Fellowship Leadership Team. Music, Worship, and Sacraments - Battery candles will be provided for Christmas Eve service. Witness and Outreach - Operation Christmas Child underway; used bible collection in January for CRY Mission; and special invites will be provided for members to use for Christmas services. Personnel Committee - Need to make annual staff reviews and recommend salaries. Stewardship Task Force – final pledge report - \$91,000. Presbytery Report - Distributed minutes of November 19 presbytery meeting.

Pastor Kling closed the meeting with prayer.
