PASTORAL REFLECTIONS

Re-reading Frankl

As a college instructor and pastor, I am constantly involved in reading and studying. Every few years, I teach an online graduate course titled "Faith and Reason in the Community of Faith." So every few summers, I find myself re-reading Frankl's *Man's Search for Meaning*. It is a powerful book that students either love or strongly dislike. One of the things students frequently say about Frankl is that he is an eternal optimist; however, I would not go so far as to call him an eternal optimist but rather a person who strongly believes that there can be hope in the midst of suffering.

Frankl's experience in a concentration camp leads him to reflect on the meaning of suffering and how one can cope with intense periods of pain or suffering. Frankl 's reflections in the concentration camp lead him to write that one survives because of something outside one's self. According to Frankl, love is the prime motivator. As I discuss with my students, Frankl's reflections indicate that the true motivator for an individual is something beyond the individual self. Frankl believes in the power of love and that true meaning in life is found beyond the self, in loving others, and focusing on the transcendent. For Christians, this is the power and grace of God. It is a life lived joyfully and boldly rooted in the Gospel and supported through communal prayer, study, and ministry.

While Frankl supports religion, his ideology allows for hope for all of humanity. All human beings at some point in their lives will experience pain or suffering; all human lives will end in death. For Frankl, "without suffering death, human life cannot be complete." As students in my ethics class at Terra learn, Aristotle believes that most of life is lived in the middle, somewhere between vice and virtue. Each person is on a journey to find that midpoint for himself or herself. Others have helped me to learn that I must live fully and live boldly in the middle of all of life, the good and the bad.

I find joy in study and find peace in my study of scripture. While the study part is easy, taking what I have learned and applying it to my own spiritual life or the real world can be a challenge. I study scripture regularly in my preparation for teaching and preaching. While on retreat in July, I was reminded again that I need to be more deliberate about how I approach my study of scripture and integrate it more with my personal prayer life. I am striving to study more with my heart and less with my

2019 PER CAPITA \$33.20 head. One of the lectionary gospel texts this summer was the story of Mary and Martha. It is very easy for me to be a Martha and focus on the exegetical task of preparing a sermon. One of my hopes during this coming year is to take more time to deliberately be Mary as I read scripture. If I spend time in the Word, I am creating fertile soil and preparing an environment for the Holy Spirit to work.

For Frankl, we have the freedom to choose our attitude or response to any situation we may find ourselves in. In his discussion of suffering, one can choose to hide from it or transcend it by focusing less on one's self and turning to serve and sacrifice for others. Frankl believes that human beings have a responsibility to choose wisely in any situation. We can choose to be a Martha or a Mary. We can choose to be stubborn and selfish or loving and forgiving.

Frankl writes in *Man's Search for Meaning*: "For the first time in my life I saw the truth as it is set into song by so many poets, proclaimed as the final wisdom by so many thinkers. The truth - that Love is the ultimate and highest goal to which man can aspire. Then I grasped the meaning of the greatest secret that human poetry and human thought and belief have to impart: The salvation of man is through love and in love."

Matthew 25 in the PC(USA): A bold vision and invitation to be actively engaged in the world.



About the Matthew 25 mark The circular shape represents unity and equality. Like God, a circle has no beginning and no end, and it symbolizes our continuing effort to help one another. The shape also suggests a globe that points to our en-

gagement with the world.

The three interlocking figures represent the equality of all people without gender or race bias. They have their arms around each other, symbolizing friendship, protection and service. The number three suggests the three focus areas of congregational vitality, structural racism and systematic poverty, as well as the Trinity.

The color palette is bright, lively, friendly and energetic — suggestive of our active commitment.

Finally, the legend "Matthew 25" below the symbol is the literal identification of the mark. We use a handwritten font to make the point that active engagement in the world requires human effort.

What is a Matthew 25 church?

Matthew 25:31–46 calls all of us to actively engage in the world around us, so our faith comes alive and we wake up to new possibilities. Convicted by this passage, both the 222nd and 223rd General Assemblies (2016 and 2018) exhorted the PC(USA) to act boldly and compassionately to serve people who are hungry, oppressed, imprisoned or poor.

How the vision unites all Presbyterians

By accepting the Matthew 25 invitation, you can help our denomination become a more relevant presence in the world. We recognize Christ's urgent call to be a church of action, where God's love, justice and mercy shine forth and are contagious. And we rejoice how our reenergized faith can unite all Presbyterians for a common and holy purpose: our common identity to do mission.

SUMMARY OF SESSION

The regular August Stated Session was held in the church library on July 31, 2019. Session members present included: Moderator Rev. Dr. Julie Kling, Jody Amor, Linda Combs, Linda Hamilton, Bob Humberger, John Roush, Larry Stout, and Bill Taylor. Don Steen and Nicole Whetstone were absent.

Pastor Kling opened the meeting with prayer from *The Presbyterian Book of Prayer* by St. Francis of Assisi. She reviewed PCUSA's introduction to "A Matthew 25 Church." She read three Bible passages: Isaiah 43:19, 1 Corinthians 3:16 and Revelation 20:3,2. She reviewed the importance of our church's vision and mission in the revitalization process. She then reviewed the values on which our efforts were to be based and concluded with what was and was not part of this initiative.

Upcoming events were noted: August 10 -Chicken BBQ Fundraiser, September 8 – First worship service upstairs, and September 15 – National Back to Church Day

While there was no action or new business, under old business Pastor Kling will seek East Side Presbyterian Church's interest in engagement at the East Side session meeting next month

The clerk had no correspondence and reported the following Sunday Worship Attendance: July 7 - 47, July 14 - 32, July 21 - 37 and July 28 - 38.

Past Kling gave a verbal report of her activities in July. She did normal Sunday preaching, coordinated and attended a cook-out for Terra student in her class, provided pastoral care of several shut-ins, and did church planning. Pastor will be on leave from August 6 - 17.

The Treasurers report is summarized as Year to date income - \$73,333, Year to date expenditures - \$57,852, Year to date surplus - \$15,481. Full Treasurers Report of June is posted on bulletin board

Leadership Team reports were Administration and Finance – The team is investigating alternative ways to distribute the monthly church newsletter. And Witness and Outreach –. The Pilgrim's Progress movie was shown to 19 people on July 25 and a cookout in July for Terra Dorm residents.

Pastor Kling closed the meeting with prayer.
