PASTORAL REFLECTIONS

Words of Light, Life, and Love

The gospel of John focuses on who Jesus is, Jesus' identity. Take a moment to reflect on your own relationship with Christ. Who is Jesus to you? In the Gospel of John, chapter 14, verse 6, Jesus says, "I am the way, the truth, and the life." Jesus is the way to God. Jesus helps us find our way. In this time of COVID19, it is especially difficult to find our way. Some of us may be struggling with health issues or financial difficulties. Finding the way is difficult. Our world has changed and our usual way of doing things has changed. So while it is always important, it is especially important now to remember that Jesus is the way. Jesus is the way to healing, redemption, and forgiveness. Jesus will lead us and help us find our way.

The Word, Jesus, became flesh so we may believe and know the way. If you examine Jesus' earthly ministry in the Gospels, we see people drop what they were doing to follow Him. People left careers, homes, and family to respond to Jesus' invitation to "Come and follow" and to go into the world to lead others to discipleship. John was an eyewitness to the truth of Jesus' ministry. Jesus came to break down barriers and walls that existed in society in his day. Jesus came to save humanity and turned the social status quo upside down. People of Jesus' time found themselves walking and living a new way.

On Sundays from now until the beginning of Advent we will journey with John as he reveals to us who Jesus is and guides us to a closer relationship with him. Join me in this deeper journey into the life of Christ. We will see that there is a general pattern to developing a closer relationship with Christ: repentance - belief - obedience.

John chapter 1, verses 1-5, serves as the introduction to the Gospel as John reminds us that Jesus is the Word of God and was and is with us. John is trying to communicate to us who Jesus is. In this COVID19 world, communication is very different. We rely on Zoom, the internet, and the telephone, and are learning to speak to others while wearing masks. John wants us to be good communicators and stresses that Jesus gives us life and is the light. In turn, we are called to be communicators of life and light. Is Kirkmont Center Still Open? YES! Read About Our Great Summer.

Were we safe? YES! None of our campers, counselors, staff, summer staff or weekly directors exhibited symptoms or tested positive for COVID 19. We continue to be vigilant in keeping lodging and dining room guests safe.

How did Kirkmont succeed when other camps closed or their safety failures were widely reported? When our facilities were closed in the spring we kept up with changes from the CDC, American Camp Association, and local county health department. Our entire staff followed regulations and guidelines rigorously. We cancelled some camps, kept our campers and groups small in population, encouraged social distancing for all camps, and only allowed staff and campers that had been in Ohio for at least two weeks. Many pools were closed this summer but not Kirkmont's; it was safely filled with happy campers.



What was new?

- Old canoes placed around camp served as hand-sanitizing stations.
- Rent-a-Cabent packages for a family to find a safe place in the woods for a range of activities and to escape a quarantined home. 27 families enjoyed the meals and activities.
- Day Camp provided safety and fun while parents were at work. Some day campers decided to stay for overnight camps.
- Homegrown Yoga Outdoor Classes.
- Renovations to Dunaway Lodge.

What are our plans? All the lodges are open. Call (937) 593-2141 to make reservations. United Way volunteers are painting the pool house interior. The next Volunteer Day is scheduled for September 19. Call to include your group. We are planning for summer 2021.

How did Kirkmont Center survive financially when the facilities were closed February through May? You responded with recurring contributions through the Presbyterian Foundation and one-time gifts. 

First Presbyterian Church Reopening Guidelines 2020

Dear Members and Friends of First Presbyterian Church,

We are planning on reopening the church for in-person worship on the first Sunday in October at 11:15 a.m. (Sunday School will be held via Zoom at 9:00 a.m., and there will be Zoom Church at 10:00 a.m. for those not comfortable meeting in person.)

Please read and plan on following the rules listed below so that we can ensure that we are able to worship safely and within the recommendations of the Sandusky County Health Department, the State of Ohio, the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church, and Maumee Valley Presbytery.

- We will follow the state color coding system to determine if we will have our service in person or on Zoom only. When we have an in-person service, we will have a Zoom service also, for a time, until all persons feel safe in resuming in-person worship. If Sandusky County is in the red or purple on Governor DeWine's Ohio County chart, we will only have Zoom services at 10:00 a.m.
- <u>Protocols for worship</u>
 - Enter the church by Garrison Street only and exit through the parking lot door
 - o Only two people will be allowed in the elevator at a time
 - Social distancing (six feet apart) will be maintained. Family units may sit together in the same pew. Please sit in the same pew each Sunday to make contact tracing easier should we need it.
 - Masks are mandated within the church on everyone over the age of two. Masks must cover the nose and mouth. Extra masks will be available at the entry doors if anyone needs one.
 - Hand sanitizer will be provided at the doors and **must** be used upon entering and is highly encouraged when exiting the church.
 - Each person attending in-person church services must take their own temperature at home before coming to church. If your temperature is over 100.0 degrees F or you feel ill, we ask that you stay home. If you have health risks, you are encouraged to stay home and en-


joy the service on Zoom or watch a TV church service.

- No congregational singing will be allowed, with special vocal music to be determined at a later date.
- Communion will be observed the first and third Sundays of the month using pre-packaged elements.(We will also offer drive-up communion for those attending Zoom service. Dates to be determined.)
- All hymnals and Bibles will be removed from the pew racks. You are encouraged to bring your own Bible with you.
- The collection plates will not be passed, but there will be containers by the back doors to the sanctuary to place your gifts and tithes in.
- ^o There will not be any childcare or Sunday School for the children.
- A record of everyone attending in-person church will be kept and seating position recorded, with a record being kept in the office to facilitate contact identification and monitoring, if needed, by the Sandusky County Health Department.
- Social Room, Kitchen, and Rest Rooms
 - ^o The doors to the kitchen will be locked until further notice.
 - Masks are mandated when in the Social Room, stairways, halls, and rest rooms, along with the sanctuary.
 - Only one person at a time in any of the restrooms.
 - Entry to the church will be through the door from Garrison Street and exit through the parking lot door.
 - ^o Please keep your coats with you in the sanctuary.
- <u>Cleaning</u>
 - The church will be cleaned on Friday prior to Sunday services, by the janitor.
 - Cleaning requirements by outside groups using the church will be discussed with each group and thoroughly explained to them before use of the church is granted.

Sharing of any future updates will be through the newsletter or the phone tree for information that needs to be distributed immediately.

Join us on Sunday mornings via Zoom for a new Bible study (began September 13). We plan to show a video at 9 a.m. and then have a short discussion about the topic. The 8 week DVD series is by Ray Vander Laan and focuses on the Life and Ministry of the Messiah. Ray visits the Holy Lands and explains the location being studied in a Bible passage. The first



visit is to the spot of Herod's palace. He then explains how the events of Jesus' day impacted his life, ministry and communication. We have viewed lessons by him before and have found them to be extremely interesting. Join us if you can! Donna Cominsky
